



Prof McCrorie studied Biochemistry at Glasgow University. He obtained a PhD in Biochemistry at St Thomas's Hospital Medical School in London. In 1974, he moved to The London Hospital Medical School to take up a post as a Research Assistant in Hematology and subsequently as a Lecturer/Senior Lecturer in Biochemistry. He became Curriculum Co-ordinator for the new course which started at St. Bartholomew's and The Royal London School of Medicine and Dentistry in 1990. He soon became Head of the Centre for Medical and Dental Education and took a full role in the planning of the 1999 curriculum at St Bartholomew's and The Royal London.

In 1999, he took up the post of Director of the 4-year MBBS Graduate Entry Programme at St George's, University of London – the first of its kind in the UK. The programme was developed partly in collaboration with Flinders University in Australia. He was granted a personal chair in Medical Education in 2002 and was Head of the Centre for Medical and Healthcare Education until August 2012. He was appointed Associate Dean for International Affairs (Education) in 2007. He retired from St George's in September 2015 but retains the title of Emeritus Professor of Medical Education.

From 2015-2017, Peter McCrorie was Dean of Medical Education at the University of Nicosia Medical School. His current title is Professor of Medical Education. His roles at UNic include advice & support, quality assurance, and staff development & training. Since 2016, he has added to his roles and is Assessment Lead for the 4 year graduate entry franchised MBBS programme. In 2017, he became Chair of the Postgraduate Clinical Training Programme Development Committee, responsible for creating a programme in Cyprus for first year graduates from the UNic MBBS degree programme, equivalent to the UK Foundation Year 1.

Peter McCrorie also works on a consultancy basis for the General Medical Council. Until 2016, he was a trainer and Lay Assessor for the GMC Performance Procedures and a member of the Training Team for the National Clinical Assessment Service. He has been involved in the Quality Assurance of 8 UK Medical Schools on behalf of the GMC and has been Team Leader for two of these, including The University of Newcastle MBBS programme in Malaysia. In 2018, he was a member of the GMC team quality assuring undergraduate and postgraduate medical training in East Midlands. Currently, he is a member of the GMC team carrying out the quality assurance of Kent Medway Medical School, one of 5 new UK medical schools.

He has been involved in the training of general practitioners and other clinicians at a postgraduate level in Russia, Romania, Macedonia and Brunei. He led a St George's team working with the Universiti Brunei Darussalam to establish a 3 year Bachelor in Health Science degree, which formed the basis for entry to the clinical courses run by specific partner medical schools in the UK, Australia and Canada.

He has worked in collaboration with universities in Australia, Japan, Ireland, Cyprus, Portugal, Malta and Italy. In 2010, he was an external member of a team from the Australian Medical Council validating the University of Queensland's medical programmes in Australia, Brunei and New Orleans. In 2012, he was a member of an international team carrying out a quality assurance review of the Australian Medical Council itself. Over a period of 2 years (2010-11) he also worked as an educational consultant for The Belgian Red Cross HIV/AIDS relief programme in Libya.

His interests lie in curriculum development, assessment, graduate entry, self-directed and problem based learning, community oriented medical education, interprofessional learning, staff development, quality assurance and the regulation of poorly performing doctors.
